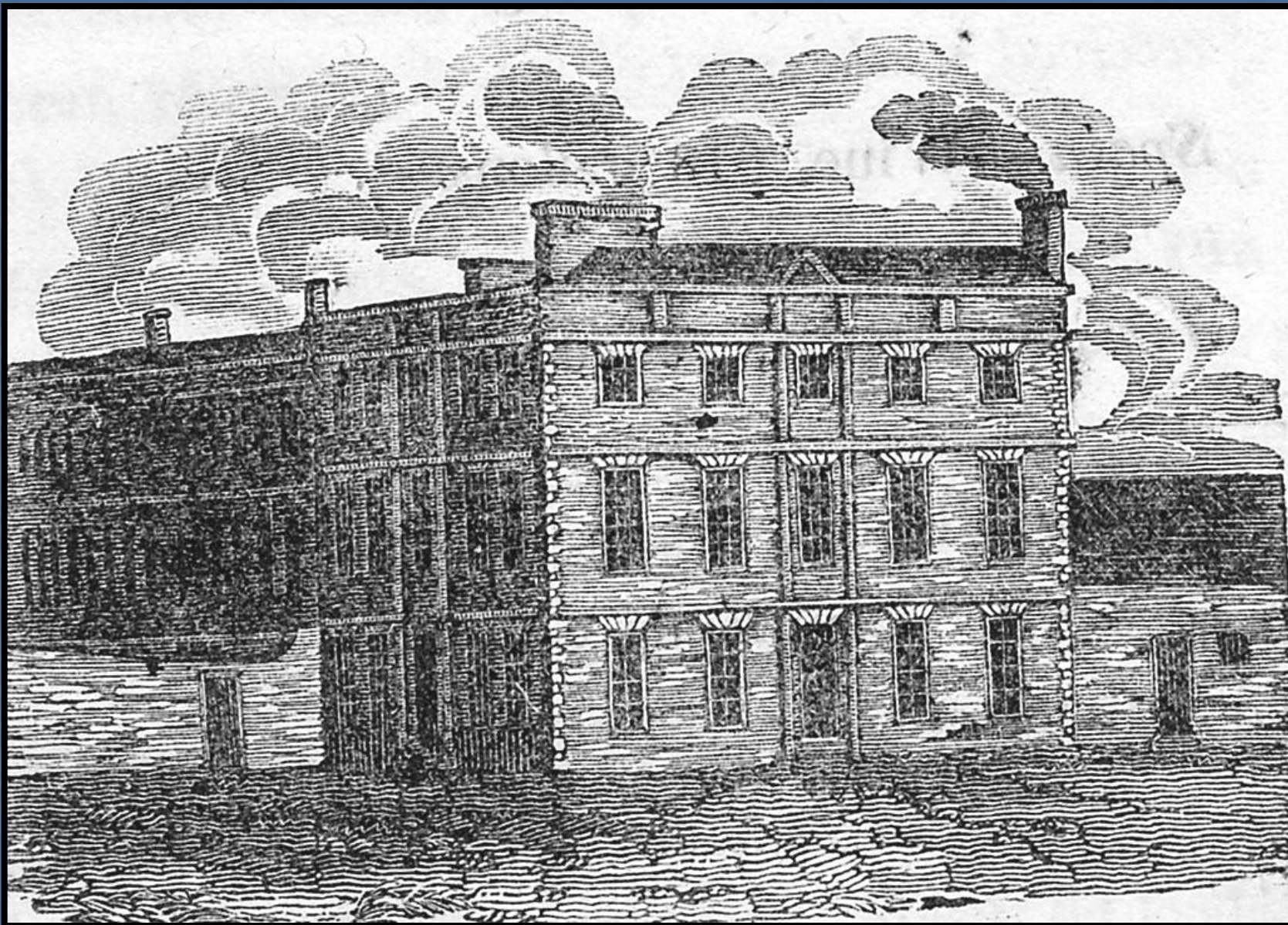

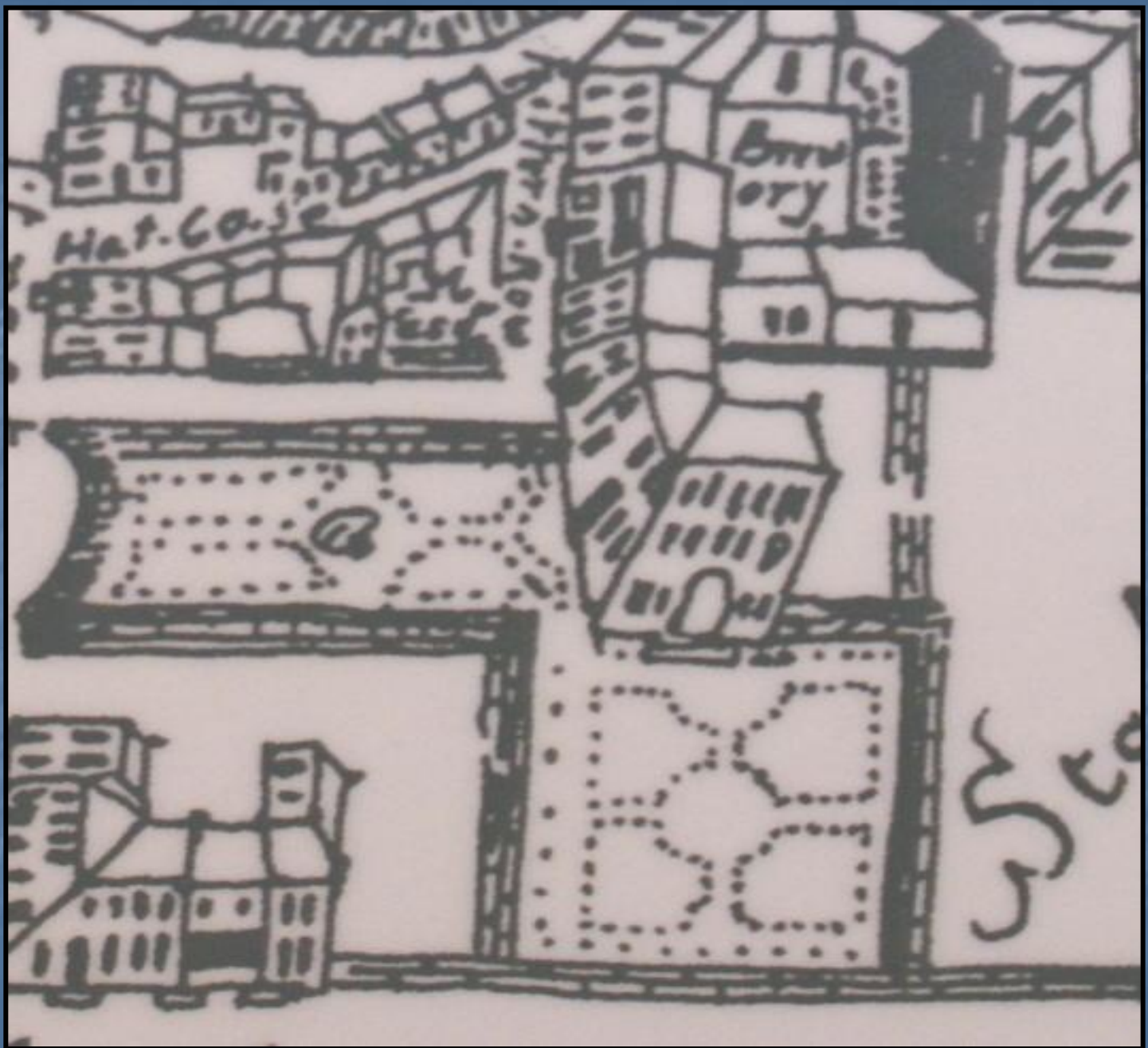




Rains Eye Plan shows the area mid 1700s.

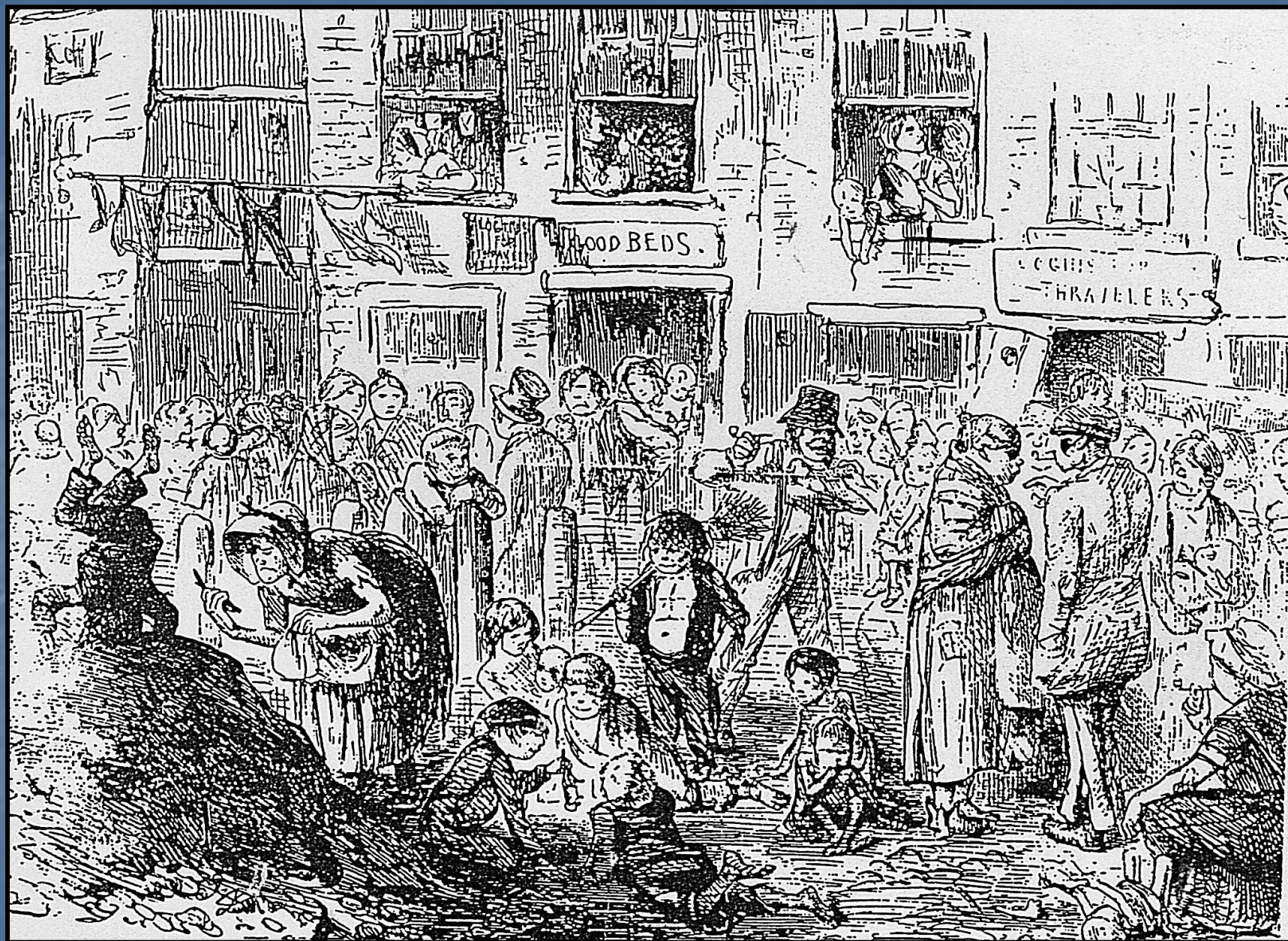


**Browne's House and the adjoining Fitters Row from
Grabutt 1819**

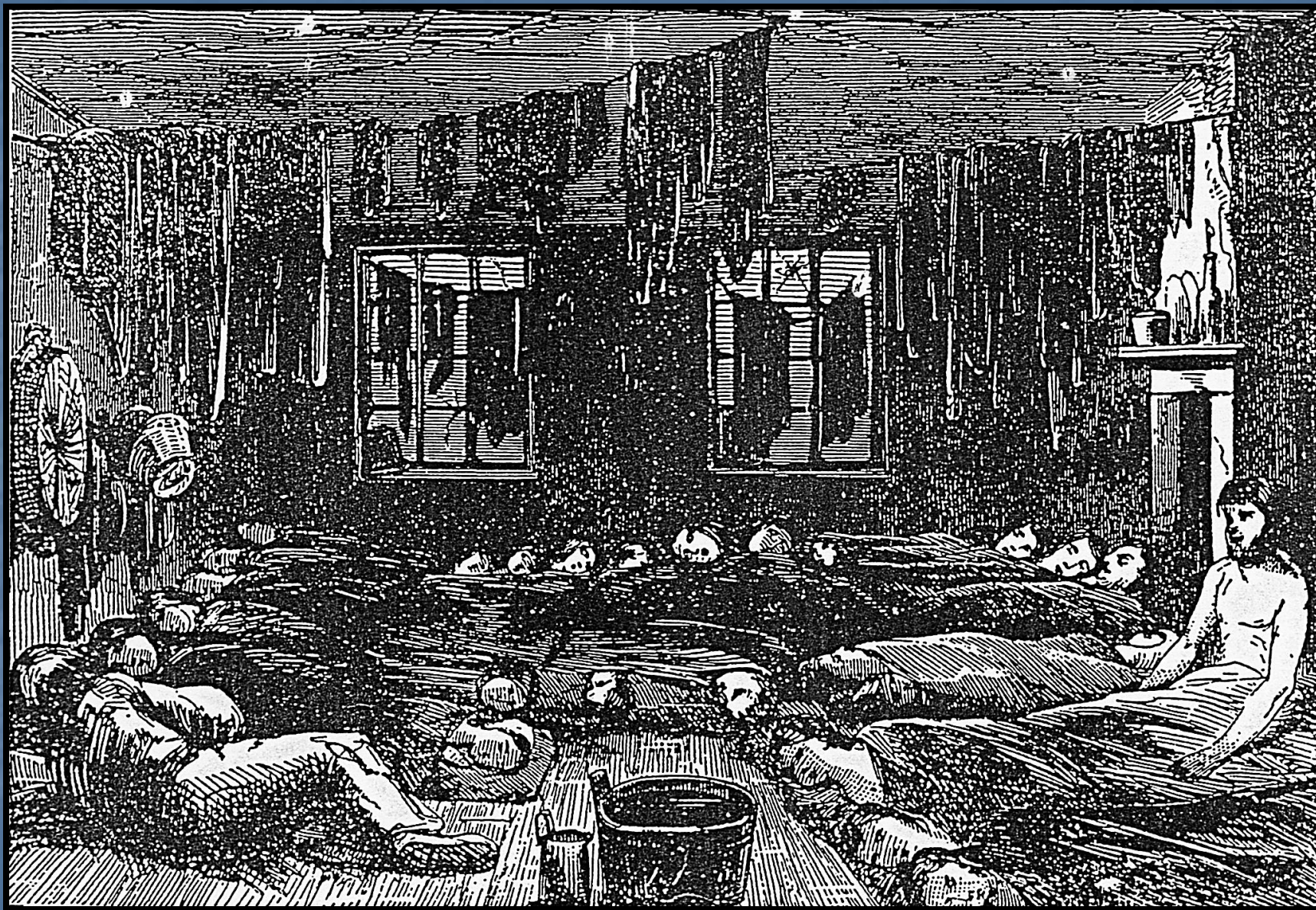

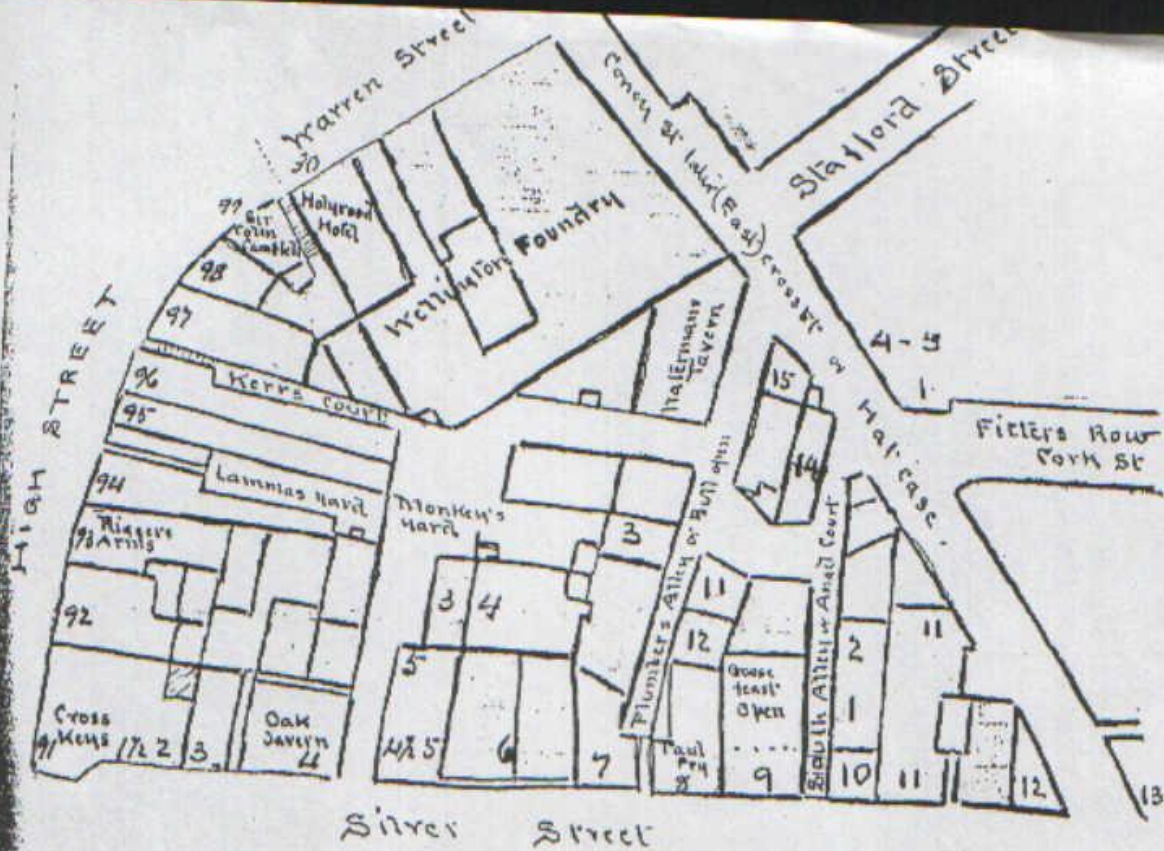

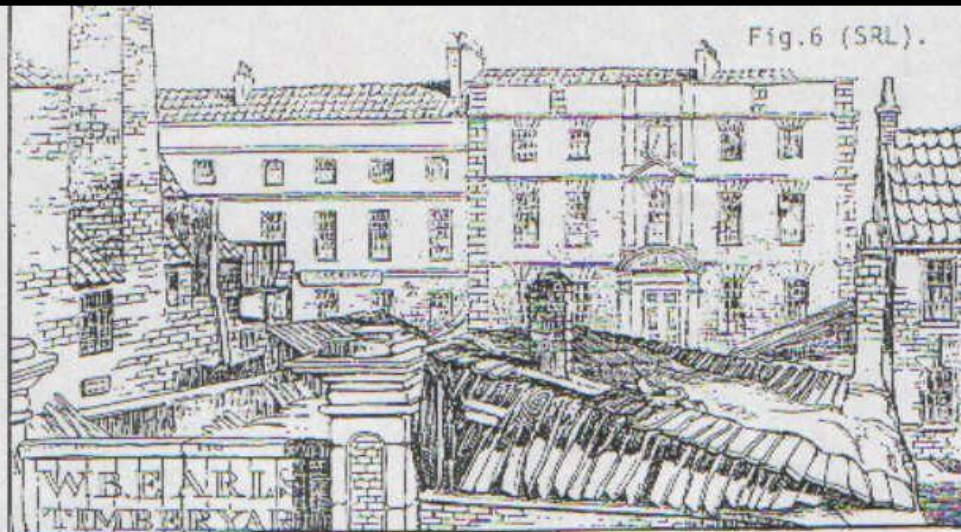

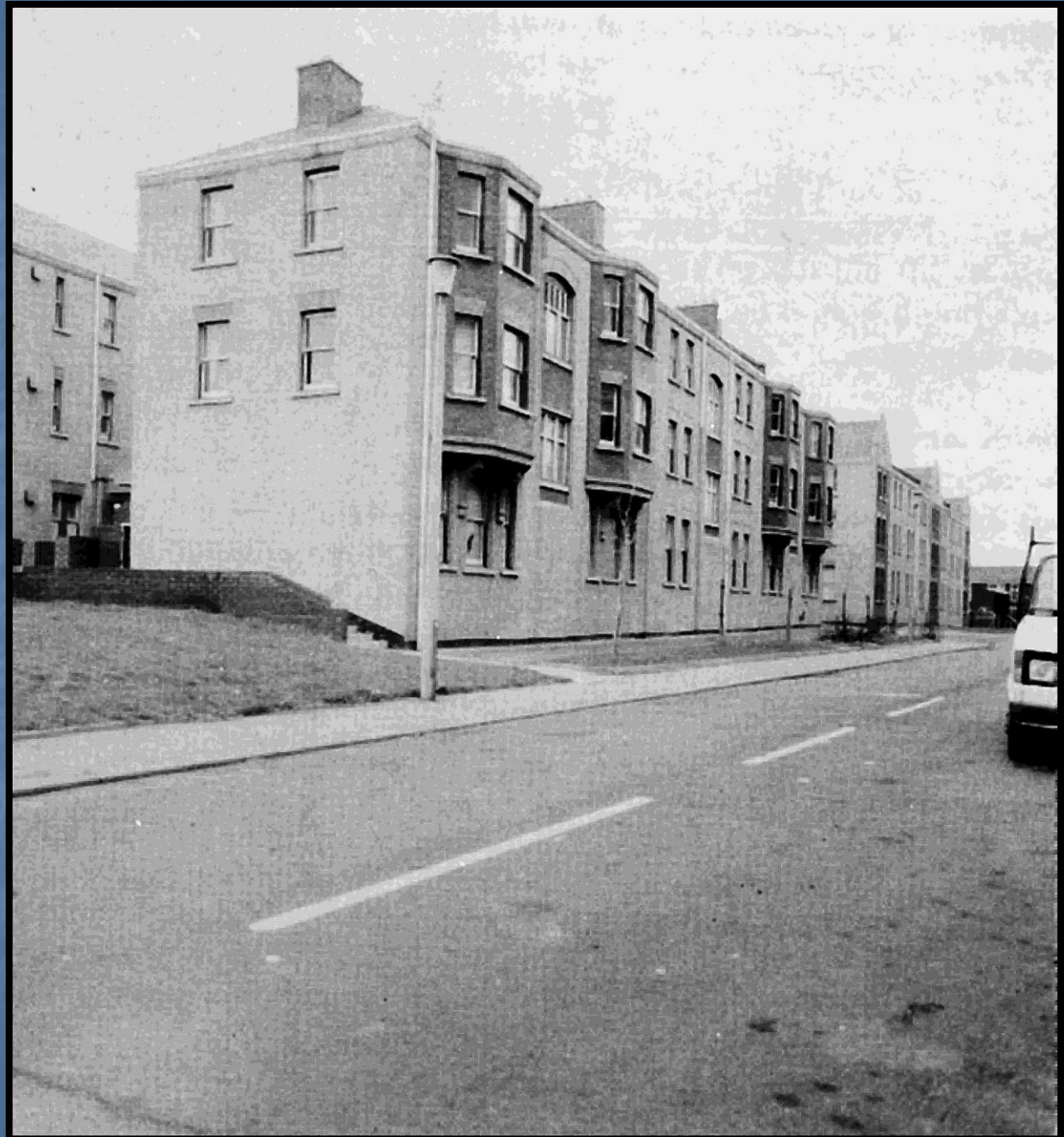

Echo report July 1959 One of Sunderland's best known characters, Mrs Margaret Latimer of Harrison Building, died at the age of 83 years. Mrs Latimer seen here on the left of picture was better known by her maiden name of Maggie O'Hare who had plied her trade as a fishwife in the town since being ten years old. Every day until shortly before she died, Mrs Latimer made the journey from her home to the Boar's Head carrying her can for a pint of beer which she drank with her supper. She once claimed "My can is able to find its own way home from the Boar's Head."
